•	Dissemination of intelligence: Directly linked to the above point - the dissemination of this is problematic. By consistently limiting distribution to a handful of very senior people, it effectively renders the intelligence meaningless. How can we identify and understand the complete picture and explore ways to mitigate a problem if only 5 people receive the information - and no-one in an operational capacity. There must be better trust in our community of intelligence professionals – we are a small community  Again, we are unable to get a complete picture of activity, and
	we are unable to make linkages/connections across our intelligence source. Silos do not help.
•	Assessment and Timing: The statement in para 14 is massively problematic – and the timing is not good.  This will raise so many questions – and one week after the election – when this information was clearly known beforehand and built up over time. There will be questions as to why this was not brought forth sooner. Have we had a chance to properly assess the material impact, and make such a statement? This is not a minor statement to make.
•	Integrity of SITE: How do we respond when asked what SITE thought of the information? Questions will be asked - more than likely at today's DMOC - about what SITE TF knew and when. Indeed, I need to be able to give my DM/ADM some guidance on what to say. The whole purpose of SITE was to review, share, assess and respond to foreign interference. This puts us in a very difficult spot, and brings into question the integrity of SITE

Finally, this is fundamental to the way we are supposed to work together as an intelligence community. I do not understand the benefit/logic in issuing such a note separately to the P5, the week after the election, without SITE being apprised of the complete picture and bottom line assessment. To put it another way, I have to question what CSIS' view/response/thoughts would be if it was CSE that sent a note like this to the P5 with such a statement – without notifying or sharing the intelligence with SITE TF partners. I cannot imagine it would be good.

There is a lot to pick through here, and we will have to speak about this in the coming days as we work through lessons learned.
