[Bots, Fake News and Election Conspiracies: Disinformation During the Republican Primary Debate and the Trump Interview](#) (2023) *Queensland University of Technology, Digital Media Research Centre*

The Twitter account of Canadian Conservative news outlet, The Post Millennial, received more impressions related to the Trump interview than any other Twitter account. The analysis provides evidence that “[X] has moved away from being a space of political deliberation and into one of predominant exposure to conservative content.”

[Disinformation and Episodes of Regime Transformation](#) – Yuko Sato, Felix Wiebrecht, and Staffan I. Lindberg (2023) *University of Gothenburg*

The presence of disinformation, and especially the government’s use of disinformation increases the probability of a democracy experiencing an episode of autocratization (shifting more towards autocracy) from 0% to 8%. For autocracies, the government’s use of disinformation helps to entrench autocrats and maintain control over their citizens, decreasing the probability of a democratization episode from 12% to 0%.

[How the People’s Republic of China Seeks to Reshape the Global Information Environment](#) – Global Engagement Center (2023) *U.S. Department of State*

Tactics and strategies used by the People’s Republic of China (PRC) to reshape the global information environment in favor of the PRC include but are not limited to: distribution of false or biased pro-PRC content through state-owned media; purchase of foreign media outlets; publishing PRC-made content in foreign media outlets; sponsorship of online influencers; advances global infrastructure for surveillance and censorship; exploits intelligence collection to shape messaging.

[Freedom on the Net 2023: The Repressive Power of Artificial Intelligence](#) – Freedom House (2023) *Freedom House*

Generative AI tools were utilized in at least 16 countries to distort information on political or social issues, and political actors in Nigeria, Venezuela, and the US deployed AI-manipulated content in electoral periods and moments of political crisis. Overall, global internet freedom declined for the 13th consecutive year.

AI generated deepfakes is contributing to a decaying information space and is undermining public trust. Government regulation of AI should aim to improve transparency and minimize the data they collect; provide effective mechanisms of public oversight and prioritize the protection of human rights; and strengthening information literacy and platform responsibility.
