Based on the intelligence gathered by and the information provided by the complainants, there is no substantial evidence that points to a provided by the having worked for the Scheer or CPC campaigns during the 2019 GE.

Furthermore, I would note that section 282.4 of the Act, undue influence by foreigners, states that no person or entity including: an individual who is not a Canadian citizen or permanent resident, a corporation or entity organized outside of Canada, a trade union that doesn't hold bargaining rights for employees in Canada, a foreign political party or a foreign government, shall, during an election period, unduly influence an elector to vote or refrain from voting, or to vote or refrain from voting for a particular candidate or registered party, at the election. For the purpose of defining unduly influence the Act

states that this will be breached if an expense is incurred to directly promote or oppose a candidate, registered party or the leader of a registered party or if one of the things done to influence the elector is an offence under an Act of Parliament.

Therefore, in layman's terms, a breach of this section of the Act would have occurred if an American citizen such as provided a contribution, monetary or nonmonetary in the form of volunteering or the provision of a service that was under market value, to the Scheer or CPC campaigns. An American working and being paid market value by a campaign for services rendered would not constitute a breach of section 282.4 of the Act. I would also note that during the 2015 general election, there were complaints received by the OCCE in regards to Stephen Harper's campaign hiring an Australian foreign national to work on the campaign. . Files associated with and the Commissioner deemed this not this incident were categorized under an offence based on the former section of the Act for unduly influence by foreigners, section 331 of the Act. Finally, open source research conducted on April 20, 2020, showed that Based on this it was advised that I wait for the CPC 2019 annual return to see if either of these names showed up on the return and if not then a phone call could be had with the financial agent or chief agent of the CPC. Searches in FRMS dating back to June 26, 2020, show that no such information has been provided on the CPC's return, however, the full return has yet to be submitted. Considering the substantial lack of evidence that would point to an offence of section 282.4 having occurred, it was suggested by the Director of Investigations that I draft up

282.4 having occurred, it was suggested by the Director of Investigations that I draft up my report to the Commissioner to have the file closed as no offence as it is not be prudent at this time to speak to the CPC about this without any substantial evidence.

III. Recommendation(s):

Based on the information gathered in this report, I recommend that the Commissioner close the file with status 1 – no offence.

On August 19, 2020 both complainants were contacted with the result of my review and informed that the file would be closed.

Non-interference by Foreigners

Marginal note: Prohibition — inducements by non-residents

- **331** No person who does not reside in Canada shall, during an election period, in any way induce electors to vote or refrain from voting or vote or refrain from voting for a particular candidate unless the person is
 - · (a) a Canadian citizen; or
 - **(b)** a permanent resident within the meaning of subsection 2(1) of the *Immigration* and Refugee Protection Act.

2019 Act

Undue influence by foreigners

- **282.4 (1)** No person or entity referred to in any of paragraphs (a) to (e) shall, during an election period, unduly influence an elector to vote or refrain from voting, or to vote or refrain from voting for a particular candidate or registered party, at the election:
- (a) an individual who is not a Canadian citizen or a permanent resident as defined in subsection 2(1) of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act and who does not reside in Canada;
- (b) a corporation or entity incorporated, formed or otherwise organized outside Canada that does not carry on business in Canada or whose primary purpose in Canada during an election period is to influence electors during that period to vote or refrain from voting, or to vote or refrain from voting for a particular candidate or registered party, at the election:
- (c) a trade union that does not hold bargaining rights for employees in Canada;
- (d) a foreign political party; or (e) a foreign government or an agent or mandatary of a foreign government.

Meaning of unduly influencing

- (2) For the purposes of subsection (1), a person or entity unduly influences an elector to vote or refrain from voting, or to vote or refrain from voting for a particular candidate or registered party, at an election if
- (a) they knowingly incur any expense to directly promote or oppose a candidate in that election, a registered party that has endorsed a candidate in that election or the leader of such a registered party;
- (b) one of the things done by them to influence the elector is an offence under an Act of Parliament or a regulation made under any such Act, or under an Act of the legislature of a province or a regulation made under any such Act.

Exceptions

- (3) For greater certainty, subsection (1) does not apply if the only thing done by the person or entity to influence the elector to vote or refrain from voting, or to vote or refrain from voting for the particular candidate or registered party, consists of
- (a) an expression of their opinion about the outcome or desired outcome of the election;
- (b) a statement by them that encourages the elector to vote or refrain from voting for any candidate or registered party in the election; or
- (c) the transmission to the public through broadcasting, or through electronic or print media, of an editorial, a debate, a speech, an interview, a column, a letter, a commentary or news, regardless of the expense incurred in doing so, if no contravention of subsection 330(1) or (2) is involved in the transmission.



In light of the information provided above, we have concluded that the circumstances as described do not contravene any provision of the Act and, as such, cannot be pursued by our Office.
